Hyperbaric medicine—healing that’s as easy as breathing

Another modality we use is Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy (HBOT). Safe, non-invasive and completely painless, HBOT is one of the most powerful treatment methods available today for healing chronic wounds. Your patient simply lies in a comfortable chamber, relaxes and breathes pressurized, 100% oxygen. This brings pure, healing oxygen to wounds and damaged tissue, helping your patient fight infection and speed the healing process. As one of the most advanced facilities in the world for hyperbaric medicine, we’re one of the select few in New York State accredited by the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society.

Hyperbaric medicine helps the body:

- Reduce inflammation that hinders blood flow to tissues
- Kill bacteria to avoid disease
- Boost the infection-fighting power of white blood cells
- Stimulate blood vessel growth in damaged tissue, bringing more oxygen and healing

The chambers are equipped with audio-visual entertainment systems, so your patient can watch movies or TV or listen to music while his or her body naturally heals.
